# Plurals

Singular means one; Plural means more than one.

- General rule: add **-s** to most nouns (books)
- Nouns ending in **s, sh, ch, x** or **z**, and some nouns ending in **g**: add **-es** (watches)
- Nouns ending in **consonant + y**: Change the **-y** into **\_and add -es** (babies)
- Some nouns ending in **f(e)**: change **f(e)** to **v(e)** and add **(e)s** (wolves)
